Dear Temple B'nai Abraham Community,

The last time I visited Israel was in the summer of 2001, just a month before September 11th. It was on the occasion of a friend from High School's wedding who had made aliyah a few years before. The ceremony took place on one of the most beautiful spots in the world, on the top of Mount Scopus, the campus of Hebrew University, overlooking East Jerusalem and the walls of the Old City.

Fighting had broken out eleven months before, in then, the most recent iteration of the Arab/Israeli conflict known simply as "Ha-Matzvav" or "the situation." Ostensibly, I was on a weeklong Reconstructionist Educators Mission that just happened to wrap up on the day of my friend's wedding. On this trip, we toured the many hot spots of the conflict and met with various politicians trying their best to explain what was happening on human terms. At that point, "the situation" felt hopeless. The bombing at the Sbarro restaurant in downtown Jerusalem had occurred only a week before and the whole country was in a state of shock. And rightfully so, the worst days of the bombings were just ahead, Jerusalem and Tel Aviv would become the primary targets of the terrorists.

While the last few years Israel has been in a state of relative peace, we are again in a time of crisis. My friend and his wife now have twins and I think of their safety, along with the many other members of my family in Israel who have been or will be called up for active duty. The American Jewish community has felt this pain directly. Our feelings are conflicted – "What can we possibly do to help? How can we take action?"

This past month, I helped organize a "Take Action for Israel" night at a Conservative congregation in Philadelphia. There, hundreds of people turned out to write letters, e-mail soldiers, call government officials, send care packages to kids in need, buy wrist bands and pins, and, most importantly, to raise money. All in all, we were able to raise over \$22,000 for Israel.

Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert and the Israeli government have come to the American Jewish community with the specific request of providing cash to: rebuild devastated homes, schools and businesses in Israel, renew the hope of the people of Israel and restore the northern communities of Israel. The United Jewish Communities (www.ujc.org), the largest Jewish fundraising group in the world, has taken on this lofty task with the hope of raising in excess of 500 million dollars.

If you are looking for a place to contribute, I would encourage to give directly to the "Israel Emergency Fund" either through the website of the Jewish Reconstructionist Federation (www.jrf.org) or through our local Federation – The Jewish Federation of Central New Jersey (www.jfedcnj.org). Every little bit will make a difference.

Sid Morginstin and Marcy Schwartz have put together a list of several other important charities dedicated to Israel that are included inside this newsletter.

We end Yom Kippur by proclaiming loudly "Hashanah Haba'ah B'Yerushalim," "Next Year in Jerusalem." When we say this prayer today, we do so by praying not only to go to Jerusalem, but to be able to go there at a time of peace.

Temple Renovations

It's been a very hectic, but exciting summer, with all of the renovations taking place at the temple. It turned out to be more work than I expected. However, the results have made it all worthwhile. This facility will be one that we can be proud of once it is all finished. The Board hired my husband, Victor Ramos, a contractor with over 20 years experience to do the renovations. While he was paid to do the upstairs and downstairs renovations, he donated his labor to renovate the bathroom. The only cost to the temple for the bathroom was the materials. The project turned out to me somewhat challenging due to the difficulties in renovating a 100 year old building. It turns out that this building doesn't have one level floor, plumb wall, or square corner. So, if you see trim not quite lined up, an extra piece of wood placed in the new display case, or a tile not quite flat, we know about it! That's just because accommodations had to be made for a floor that is uneven or slopes or walls that are not plumb.

As for the decor, we chose "historical" colors of blue and gold to fit with what would be appropriate for this historic building. We also used a color scheme, dark enough to be user friendly to our children so we would not have to worry about fingerprints, but still colorful. The board hired our co-sisterhood president, Bonnie Friedman, who has a painting business, to do all of the faux painting. You will see that some of the walls are faux painted, again to make them more kid friendly. I'd like to thank Bonnie for all of her patience in working with us to make color selections.

We will be done with the major portion of the renovations before our services start up this fall. However, there are other items that we will still be working on through the fall such as replacing the air conditioners, door to the kitchen, and replacing the tables and chairs. We didn't forget about these items, just didn't have the time to complete them yet.

I would like to make a special thanks to Eileen Gale who has worked tirelessly with me all summer on these renovations. Her help has been invaluable.

Information on Aliyahs and Yahrzeits from Sid Morginstin

Following is how the Aliyahs for the High Holidays are given to members of the Temple:

The first choice goes to present and past board members. After that I select members who I recall seeing more or less regularly at services. Guests, as a rule, do not get an Aliyah.

The revised YAHRZEIT list will be posted at the Temple shortly. Please check it to make sure the data for your loved one is correct. If changes are needed, please call me (298-2801) or send in writing to PO Box 8101, Trenton, NJ 08650 or email at Sidmorgy@verizon.net.

The YAHRZEIT date is based upon the Hebrew date of death. The secular date will vary each and every year. Each August I take the book with the 150-YEAR CALENDAR home and update the computer Yahrzeit Database. The Database has the Hebrew date of death (MONTH & DAY). I add in the equivalent Secular dates for the upcoming year and the nearest Friday. If the Yahrzeit should fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or Monday, I enter the preceding Friday. For Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, I enter the subsequent Friday. If you can not make the designated date, it is OK to say Kaddish on the closest Friday (or Saturday). It is traditional that one makes a donation to the temple on the Yahrzeit in memory of your loved one. For more information on the dates, go to Hebcal.com.

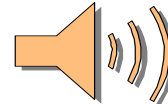
